Description: Online and blended learning has proven to cost-effectively meet critical educational needs by providing opportunities that are not available, leveraging highly qualified teachers, and serving students with unique educational needs. As many districts across Wisconsin are planning online or blended programs for their districts, there is much to learn in the development of a quality district digital learning program. During this session critical areas to consider when planning, implementing, and evaluating your digital learning initiatives will be presented.

Projected Deliverables:

1. Capture ideas on how Wisconsin schools are implementing K-12 online/blended programs.
2. Learn guiding questions for planning in the big four focus areas: content, teaching, technology, and operations.
3. Learn when planning a digital learning program there are important components to be considered such as benefits and limitations, how to manage resources, and developing a quality implementation plan.
