What are your barriers to learning? Why do you think you maintain these barriers? Are you even aware that these barriers exist? If you are aware of these barriers, how does one begin to address them? Most importantly, how do these barriers impact the students you work with? Behavior plans often fail as the result of adult perspectives on behavior. Adult experiences, mindsets and attitudes are often deeply ingrained and serve as significant barriers to student success. Although an important variable, adult views on behavior are often overlooked despite the impact they have on our ability to effectively deal with student behavior.
