

1. Creating an Intervention System that Works for Everyone

This session will provide an overview of UDL, and participants will understand how the brain-based, and practice-informed UDL principles can help reduce barriers to learning and increase every child's access to, and success in, inclusive classrooms.

3. College and Career Ready through Self-Advocacy

Description: Self-advocacy is a critical part of preparing students to be college and career ready.

How can you incorporate strategies across a student's day to develop self-advocacy skills? How can you incorporate these skills into IEP goals and developing the PTP? How can you guide your students to develop these components of Self-Advocacy?
