Description:

Morning Part 1 - Help Teachers Love Reading: A lot of time and effort is spent in classrooms encouraging students to become lifelong readers. But are teachers expecting students to become something they themselves are not? Lifelong readers read every day, share what they read, and surround themselves with reading material. Attendees will learn simple strategies and great books that will engage and energize all of us to lead literate lives and see the effect being a reader has on students.

Morning Part 2 - Help Readers Love Reading: Teaching students how to read is only part of the battle. What can teachers do to foster a love of reading? Learn how to energize readers with books they love and hear numerous, kid-tested, K-8 titles. Engage students with simple classroom strategies and learn ways to create a reading community where students, both inside and outside the classroom, can lead literate lives.

Afternoon Part 1 - Books for the Content Areas: Adding children's books to content areas allows students to learn from high quality, age-appropriate reading material in addition to textbooks. Books can be used to activate prior knowledge, introduce new information, and most importantly, engage students immediately in each lesson. Attendees will learn numerous fiction and nonfiction titles as well as mini-lesson ideas that can be applied to numerous books across grade levels.

Afternoon Part 2 - Online Tools to Help Teachers and Engage Readers: The Internet is loaded with tools for teachers and students. Unfortunately, we don't always have the time to sift through them all. Attendees will be presented with several excellent ways teachers can utilize the Internet. Numerous online and digital tools for students will also be shared. Allow students to make digital posters, move reading response journals online, use mobile devices to extend learning outside the classroom, and use mobile apps to connect and respond to literature.
