In this session, you'll learn more about what mindfulness is and what the latest research says about its effectiveness in school settings. You'll also learn simple mindfulness practices that you can use in your own life for managing stress and finding moments of peace and calm.

Learn how early auditory access influences speech/language and pre-literacy skill development and foundational skills for academic success. A shift in our thinking about hearing with the ears needs to change to hearing with the brain; the ears are simply the doorway to the brain. When the doorway isn't blocked and auditory access is achieved, verbal communication reaches the brain, neural development occurs, skills are learned, and academic successes happen!

The School Safety Initiative helped bolster the main entrances and infrastructure in school facilities around the state. It also aimed to boost mental health training among staff, foster healthy relationships with local law enforcement, and create updated safety plans. Now that the policies are in place and the training is scheduled, it's time to put your knowledge to the test. Local law enforcement professionals will team up with CESA 10 to walk attendees through how to spot suspicious items, behaviors, and situations in schools. This hands-on presentation will define common characteristics and past identifiers of active shooters, give real-life examples of warning signs that occurred before a major incident in area schools, and test attendees on how many suspicious items they can spot throughout the presentation.

We'll explore the important role that *presence* plays in nurturing relationships, building leadership capacity, and teaching effectively.
